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1. Your tasks

Research information about your chosen career choice:

1. What the job involves e.g. Teacher. Name two other related jobs- e.g. social worker, lecturer.
2. List your skills and qualities and identify what you need to work on for your chosen career e.g. reliable, trustworthy, time management, organised etc. Use the "Diamond 9" format.

Qualifications Required:

A level/ BTEC level 3 subjects needed for your chosen career path e.g. Pharmacist – Chemistry, and two subjects from Biology, Maths, Physics.

Training and Entry Routes:

1. UCAS — University
2. Level 3 Apprenticeships

Work experience:

1. List five local companies you could contact with a view to completing a work experience / job shadow placement with them.
2. Write a letter requesting a placement.

Mentoring Discussion:

1. Prepare a **Fact Sheet** to discuss your future career aspirations/path with your tutor.
2. Use your course analysis/Apprenticeship information sheets to support this.

Evidence:

1. Produce a folder containing the evidence listed above.
2. Hand your folder in to your tutor on Monday 23rd March 2020 for feedback.

3. What is research?

One of the definitions of research is “the quest for knowledge, data and truth”. It doesn’t matter what you are doing, you are always on a quest.



How to begin

Think of a career pathway or industry/sector that you are interested in. Determine your strategy by identifying keywords in your topic, for example “Teaching” or “Creative Industries”. For your chosen career pathway or industry you will need to produce the following:

1. **Fact Sheet-** this will form the basis of your discussions in your first mentoring session.
2. **Information Sheet-** based on the material gathered through your research.

Remember to place all information and the Sheets into your folder

To help with the research consider Labour Market Information (LMI). LMI is “any qualitative or quantitative facts, analysis or interpretation about the nature and operation of the labour market” (World Skills UK)

LMI is an important aspect of this research project. By having an increased awareness of the current LMI you are able to make better informed decisions about your future. As a student, LMI can help identify entry requirements, skills and abilities required for a course or it could allow you to understand future job prospects for a selected course. For Jobseekers, LMI can help identify job opportunities and help identify trends, salaries and labour market conditions for your chosen career.

Below are some areas that you may want to include on your Fact Sheet, but your research must *not* be limited to this alone:

- What qualifications are needed?
- What skills and abilities are important?
- Consider entry requirements
- Consider future employment prospects
- Salary and the working environment

4. Skills and abilities

Knowledge and qualifications are very important but a focus on an individuals wider skills base and their character is just as vital both for adult life and the world of work. Skills and abilities are also known as hard and soft skills, core skills, key competencies or employability skills. This activity aims to identify, develop and record your skills and enhance a greater sense of self awareness. Here is a list of the key skills most employers look for when recruiting . Take a look through these skills and complete as much of the information as you can.

5. Develop your personal brand

Social Media plays a huge part of researching your chosen career pathway or industry. Many employers use social media for marketing, recruitment and screening of applicants. Some sectors have specific media platforms for example "Cucumbertown" for chefs/cooks, "Exploroo" for travel/tourism and "Epernicus" for research scientists. Does your chosen career pathway have one?

Think about your online presence, create a plan on how to improve it or develop it. Save this into



Use your network to find out who is hiring locally.
Manage your privacy settings carefully to make sure employers can't see pictures and posts you don't want them to see!



- Follow relevant companies and individuals to help you find out more about them.
- Use as a platform to share your knowledge about your area of interests and grow your followers.



- Use as your online CV.
- Connect with people who can help you gain experience and build your knowledge and networks.
- Contribute to group discussions to get yourself recognised.
- Seek out job opportunities that companies post on LinkedIn.



- Showcase your capabilities by uploading video footage of yourself demonstrating your expertise and experience.
- Consider constructing a video alternative to a CV.



- Sites such as Google Plus can help you to bring all your 'good' online content together in one place.
- By having a Google Plus account you will boost your prominence on Google search results.



- Demonstrate your artistic, design and creative skills on Pinterest and use as a platform to share your work with the creative industries.

6. Pathway after the Sixth Form

After completing the research into your desired career path, it will give you ideas of the steps you need to complete in order to achieve your goal.

In some cases, it will require higher education and pursuing a place at University. For others,

The following pages will provide you with guidelines for each scenario.

It is wise to complete the activity for both university and an apprenticeship in order for you to be able to consider all options at this stage.

SCENARIO 1: "I WOULD LIKE TO GO TO UNIVERSITY"

Step 1

Use the website www.sacu-student.com ('SACU' is 'UCAS' spelt backwards) and use the Spartan Test in the 'Research Tools' section to explore what courses might interest you.

It is free and very helpful for gauging your interests and suggesting related degree courses.

Step 2

Use the website www.ucas.com to research the course requirements (SACU will offer these too). Note that UCAS is the official site for applying to university. Make sure you know what specific grades or tariff points are required. Courses will take into account your **GCSE** grades as well as your A level and BTEC predicted grades.

**Now choose SIX universities that offer your desired course.
Find out the entry requirements and enter them into the
Course Analysis Sheets on the next pages.**

Remember to research the UCAS grade & tariff points system so that you understand how this works, the advantages/ disadvantages and which universities accept which (and why!)

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SCENARIO 2 : "I AM INTERESTED IN AN APPRENTICESHIP"

Sometimes it can be hard to motivate yourself to study if you don't intend to go to university. So it is worth checking out the sort of grades expected for high-level apprenticeships and careers that recruit students who have completed Sixth Form.

Step 1

Register on the government web site that advertises apprenticeships for your area:

- For England www.apprenticeships.org.uk
- For Scotland www.myworldofwork.co.uk/modernapprenticeships
- For Wales www.careerswales.com
- For Northern Ireland www.delni.gov.uk/apprenticeships

Step 2

Research SIX apprenticeships that might interest you. As a quick guide you will most likely be interested in Level 3 Apprenticeships (those at A Level and BTEC level 3 standard). More about apprenticeships - Level 4 (slightly higher than A level but not degree level), Level 5 (at Foundation degree level / HND) or Level 6 (at degree level).
